Rally Day—September 11—features a new activity this year which fits perfectly with the *Signpost's* walking/biking theme. At 3:30 in the afternoon everyone in town is invited to join together and walk or run up to 3.5 miles on beautiful roads starting at the elementary school.

Noncompetitive community and club walks are popular in Europe, particularly in Germany, where they are called Volksmarches (meaning “peoples’ march”). Walkers keep track of their distance and collect pins from marches in many countries.

We would like to get a tally of how many participate on Rally Day and how many miles we cover in total; we think the numbers will be impressive. In order to do this, each participant will receive a “passport” card. There will be markers at each one-half mile along the way, and folks will stamp the passports, indicating that they’ve reached that checkpoint. At the end of the day we will announce how many walkers and runners we had and how far we travelled as a group.

Since some of us just need to go at full throttle, this course can be run as a footrace. Runners will be given race numbers and the top finishers will be recorded and posted by supertime. Runners and walkers alike will enjoy the water stops and front porch “rest areas” at several places along the way.

Younger kids will love the StoryWalk along the first portion of the course. They will find a page at a time of a fun children’s book, each laminated and mounted on

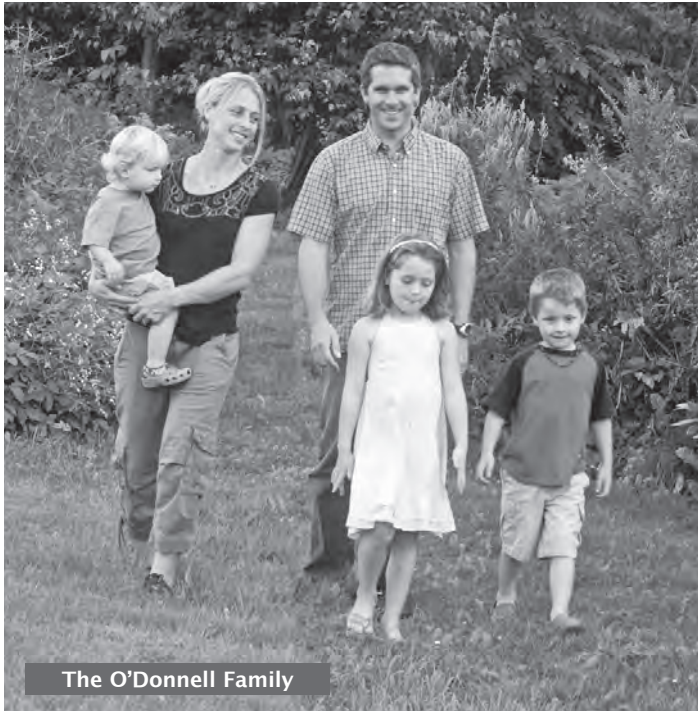
stakes at intervals along the way. Kids (and adults too) enjoy following the story so much, they forget they’re exercising!

The route is designed for all ages and abilities. If you take a look at the map, you’ll see that you may turn around at any half-mile point. Once you’ve gone one and one-half miles though, you might as well keep going forward and do the entire three and one-half mile loop! The average person can walk this distance without stopping in under an hour. Your reward will be beautiful vistas, conversations, and the satisfying feeling that comes from exercise.

Mother Teresa said, “It is impossible to walk rapidly and be unhappy.” Come join us at the Rally Day community walk, and go rapidly or as slow as you’d like. You’re guaranteed a happy time.

My favorite hiking spot is anywhere I can get to on foot from my house on Templeton Road, with the minimum exposure to roads. The length of the town trail that is on Templeton Road itself is about as much as I want to tolerate! —Martha Holden

The first time I wandered down an East Montpelier trail (a.k.a. The Logging Road) was shortly after we built our house on Dodge Road in 1983. We noticed the trailhead right across the road from our property and decided to venture down it. We had three young children, one of whom was in a back carrier at the time, and when we got to the spot where the woods opened up to the fields of Fairmont Farm, we stood there for several minutes and just inhaled the sight. My oldest daughter, who was just seven at the time, quietly remarked, "I feel like I'm dreaming." I think that summed up our feelings quite aptly. Here we were, in the midst of this stunningly beautiful landscape of fields framed by woods, with mountain peaks far in the distance. That day, in the early fall of the year, had the additional benefit of a clear blue sky with the reds, oranges, and yellows of the sugar maples interspersed with the pines.

I have been down that road many times since then in all of the many seasons that Vermont has to offer and each one has its own particular beauty. I am so appreciative of the fact that the trails are available to everyone and that they are places for

reflection, observation, and conversation (as well as exercise). I love being able to snowshoe and ski those trails and go for miles feeling privileged to be living in a community where such things are valued and where landowners have made it so accessible. The trail near us is well traveled by dogs and their owners alike, and it has a small parking area with large boulders blocking the entrance to motorized vehicles.

We get exercise playing tennis, walking the dog, and doing garden and lawn work, but it's bicycling the hilly East Montpelier roads that gives us our real aerobic workout. We live off Towne Hill Road, so all of our rides begin and end with a hill! One of our favorite rides involves going up Bliss Road to Center Road where we turn right and continue on Center Road to Templeton. We take a left on Templeton and ride out to County Road where we turn right and a mile or so later take another right onto Haggett Road. That brings us down into Adamant. Could there be a more beautiful or welcoming hamlet in all of Vermont? We can count on conversation and a snack at the Co-op before we hop back onto our bikes for the peddle home. We usually take Sodom Pond Road in hopes of spotting some Adamant wildlife and then turn left at Sibley Road continuing past the Four Corners School and EMES before veering off onto Cherry Tree Hill Road which brings us back to Towne Hill Road.

This loop is about 15 miles and is mostly on gravel roads. The views are incredible and peddling along at a modest bicycle speed enables us to admire the homes and gardens along the way.

The East Montpelier Town Forest is a little gem that I am hesitant to share with you. I selfishly want to keep it to myself, keep it a secret, but it really is your forest. The trails crisscross throughout the forest, long trails and short, offering options depending on your desire for the day.

There are pine woods, hardwoods, mosses, fungi, unusual woods plants, swamp, and an old pond. Of course, there are many varieties of critters in the woods, and we value each of them—birds, deer, skunks, porcupines, bear—so please keep your dogs on leashes if you take them with you. The Trails Committee has done a great job of keeping the trails open and marked—Janet's (MacLeod) small animal track markers will keep you from getting lost. We have also been lucky to have East Montpelier/Adamant resident Leon Harris keep much of the forest paths clear of fallen trees.

There is a magical feel to the woods while you are in there, lost from the sounds of civilization. When my now-grown son was little, he used to say that it was like the land of Robin Hood and his Merry Men. Maybe it is.

I don't think a day goes by when I don't appreciate how lucky I am to live right next to the amazing East Montpelier trail system. At the moment, my favorite spot is about 100 yards from our house. I discovered it in early July. Fern, our dog, and I were heading out on the trail that takes us to Mallory Brook. Fern suddenly stopped and I could see her cautiously smelling something. I began praying it was neither a porcupine nor a skunk.

When I reached the spot it took me several seconds to see a fawn lying on her side, her unblinking eyes open, totally still except for the flaring of her nostrils. She was so still and so well camouflaged I doubt I would have noticed her without Fern's help. I quickly decided she was near death and headed back home with Fern at my side. I wanted to ask my husband, Mark, who's a large animal vet, to look at her and determine if she should be euthanized. He told me he is not allowed to treat "wild" animals, but that he'd give her a look. As we headed back down the path, I was holding out the slightest hope that the fawn would somehow survive whatever injury had downed her right next to the path.

Maybe you've already guessed the happy ending to my story. We're pretty sure the mom heard Fern and me on the path and told her baby to lie down and play dead. My happy conclusion is we were all in the right place, at the right time, doing just what we were supposed to be doing, and until my next adventure on the East Montpelier Trail, that's my favorite spot!

East Montpelier Trails & Trail Usage

The East Montpelier Trails Committee hopes all *Signpost* readers have been able to get out and enjoy some of the many miles of its trail network that are found in town. The map of the trail network can be found on the web site at <http://emsignpost.com/Trail%20Map-2.17.08.pdf> and there are copies at the Town Office.

The Trails Committee reminds everyone that use of ATVs or other motorized vehicles is NOT allowed on any of the trails. The trails in our network were not designed for such high impact uses and, in most areas, the trail is actually on land that remains privately owned. Property owners of these lands have not allowed use by ATVs or any motorized vehicle. Please respect our trails and this prohibition. Use of ATVs on any public highway or town road (class 1, 2, or 3) is illegal according to state statute. Persons owning ATVs wanting to know of places that are legal to ride should contact the Vermont ATV Sportsman's Association by calling the association at (802) 477-5075 or by visiting VASA's web site: <http://www.vtvasa.org>.

Persons noting trail maintenance needs or observing prohibited uses on any of the trails may contact any member of the East Montpelier Trails Committee. Enjoy the trails—a wonderful resource that helps to make East Montpelier such a great place to live.

EMFD's New Station: We're In!

The department began moving in and operating out of the new fire station on May 15, 2010. We have settled in and are finishing up small details and getting used to operations in the new building. It is a pleasure for all us volunteers to have such a well-organized and efficient workspace.

The building is spectacular and has lived up to all our promises to the voters. It is an extremely "green" building. Wall insulation values are R-35 and roof insulation is R-60. The windows are triple-glazed energy savers. All our lighting is energy-efficient (and we received a credit from Efficiency Vermont for \$5,700 for all the fixtures). The pellet boiler is set for use, and we received a Clean Energy Development Fund grant of \$38,700 to help pay for it.

We are still finalizing the project cost, but early estimates indicate a total less than \$2 million. Due to the great pricing by all the contractors and countless hours of volunteer efforts, we have saved taxpayers money and have added over \$50,000 worth of upgrades to the project.

We are proud of the community room and kitchen space, which are available for use by town

residents and community groups. We have capacity for up to 30 people in a meeting and an available warming kitchen if food is to be served. So far, the Planning Commission, a village group, and the Fire District have held meetings in the room. Both selectboards had an Emergency Management training session at the station. Department member Steve Chase has made beautiful tables from trees harvested near his home. Come use the space.

We have also worked with Charlie Hoffert who planted a community garden on the land behind the fire station. He is growing fresh produce for the community food shelf. We applaud his efforts.

We are planning a major open house for Saturday, October 2—rain date Sunday, October 3. Official dedication/ "wetdown" is at 1 p.m. with open house from 2:00–5:00 p.m. In the meantime, stop by, and we will proudly show you around!

And most of all, thanks to all of you who supported us in this project. With the ambulance service, we have grown into a full-service fire department and desperately needed a new space to operate from. The new station will serve us well into the future.

You are invited, also, to visit the new station on the morning of Rally Day, September 11, 9 a.m. to noon.

Paulie's Recipe Corner

Corn Relish

This recipe from Mrs. R. Wheeler was in The Community Cookbook. Sponsored by the Friendly Circle – North Montpelier

4 large onions 4 green peppers 18 ears uncooked
2 red peppers 1 head cabbage corn

Put all through food chopper

1 quart vinegar 2 tbsp. dry mustard
½ cup flour 2 tsp. salt
3 cups sugar 2 tsp. turmeric

Cook all together, then add onions, peppers, cabbage, and corn.
Simmer one-half hour in a Dutch oven.

Paulie's comment.

This is good on hot dogs, hamburgers, or as a side dish. Can be put in sterilized jars and sealed.

The George Allen Memorial Forest (aka Town Forest)

Historical Perspective

In 1915, the Vermont General Assembly authorized the expenditure of town funds to procure land for town forests. If the property totaled 40 acres or more, the state forester would offer free advice on management. At first, town forests were to be school endowment forests, but a 1917 revision in the law changed this to municipal forests. There were many advantages to such a plan: such a forest would protect the watershed, promote reforestation and other good forestry practices, as well as provide income to the town through the sale of marketable timber.

By 1951, the Legislature required towns to vote on the establishment of their town forests and every year thereafter until there was an affirmative vote.

The 1960 East Montpelier town report listed members of the newly formed Town Forest Committee: T. Raymond Clark, Lyle Young, Bradford Lane, E. Warner Shedd, Jr., and George Allen. In 1962 and 1963 the town purchased three parcels of land for \$2100, creating a 110 acre town forest. Located off Haggett Road between the County Road and Adamant, much of the land had recently been cut over, and the rest was covered with seedlings only.

Between 1967 and 1970 Boy Scouts pruned white pine and planted 1,000 red pine seedlings. In 1971, 20,334 board feet were taken out of a small portion of the forest, and the town received \$305.31 in stumpage income. Again, in 1979, the thinning process continued and the town received \$540 in stumpage. The forest was named the George Allen Memorial Forest in 1991, in honor of the many hours George spent establishing a forest management plan.

The 2010 Town Report shows \$25,985.81 in the Town Forest account. In recent years, money from the account was used to purchase a wood chipper for roadside trimming that's done periodically in town. East Montpelier's trail system is enhanced by passing through the forest. Town Forest Committee members are appointed to three-year terms by the Selectboard.

Town Office Display

The historical window at the Town Office, managed by Conrad and Anne Ormsbee, includes old photographs of "Haying and Summer" with many pictures from 1905 through 1953. The oldest picture is of a horse and hay rake taken in 1905. Also standing at attention is a three-tined pitch fork waiting for someone to take on the job of pitching hay! Planning Commission Plans

Rick Hopkins, PC Chair

The Planning Commission (PC) is scheduling meetings with representatives of community committees and boards in town with two goals in mind: to lay the groundwork for an updated Town Plan that will be completed in 2013; and to begin to develop a comprehensive capital plan that will reflect the future needs of East Montpelier. This latter approach was strongly suggested at informational meetings held this spring by the School Board with regard to upgrades at the elementary school.

The PC will meet on September 2 with land use and natural resources-related committees and on September 16 with public services-related committees. Both meetings will start at 7 p.m. in the new EMFD Fire Station. The PC will use information gathered at these meetings to develop a questionnaire to solicit input from EM townspeople. The PC met with community resources-related committees on August 19.

Town Road Projects

Work on the new intersection of Routes 2 and 14 has finally begun. Wires have been moved, and construction started on August 10.

The Selectboard has approved paving Towne Hill Road from Brazier/Gallison Hill Road to Cherry Tree Hill Road. The town received a Class 2 paving grant from the state that will pay for 80% of this work. The paving (shim and overlay) will start sometime in mid-August.

US 2 Commuter: On the Road to Success

In April of 2010, the Green Mountain Transit Agency (GMTA) and Rural Community Transportation (RCT) began operating the new US 2 commuter service to provide connecting service between Washington and Caledonia counties. Now as summer ends and routine travels to work and school begin, many residents seem to be looking at the US 2 as a transportation option. "When we started this service, the hope was to meet the first year goal of 37 boardings per day," said Tawnya Kristen, GMTA Community Relations Manager. "Now after only 2 months of ridership, the route has already very nearly met this with a recorded 36.6 riders per day. The communities have quickly embraced this alternative and we couldn't be happier."

The US 2 offers convenient and affordable service to Twinfield School, Goddard and CCV, along with connections to Montpelier, St. J, and other GMTA commuter routes like the Link Express and Waterbury Commuter.

Fire District Formation in Final Stages

The East Montpelier Selectboard has given preliminary approval for the creation of the East Montpelier Fire District #1 culminating six months of work by a volunteer group composed of current customers of the Crystal Springs Water Company. This group is working to complete the groundwork necessary to ultimately negotiate and purchase the water system from the owner who wishes to retire.

As part of this approval, the Selectboard has a 60-day window in which to define the district borders. Residents within the proposed boundaries of the fire district have been notified by the Selectboard that they will be part of the fire district. At the end of the 60-day period, on September 10, 2010, the Selectboard will finalize and record the resolution establishing the fire district.

After this date, the SB will warn the first official meeting of the fire district, which will likely be held on or around October

18, 2010. At this meeting, presided over by the SB, the legal voters of the district (not necessarily the property owners, but rather the legal voters of the town who reside within the district) will elect a prudential committee (essentially a selectboard for the district) and various other officers and adopt by-laws for the district. At this point the fire district will become a functioning municipal corporation for the purpose of providing water service to the district should it be able to negotiate a fair price to purchase the water system.

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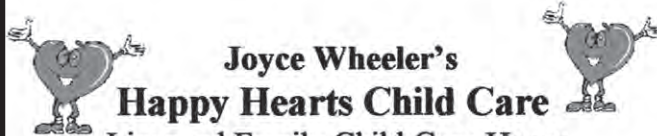
